Highlight Calendar

September 2020:

First Planting, Eight Engelmann Oaks planted by City of San Diego Crew.

October 2020:

Received our largest grant from the County of San Diego.

November 2020:

ROE received, no digging awaiting the approval of gas monitor.

Working with Covid-19 County regulations, Paradise Gardeners volunteers worked in family groups to install 82 cubic yards of mulch on sheets of cardboard.

January 2021:

Received verification of gas monitor and authorization to dig.

Planted Western Red Buds in the Pollinator Garden.

Rented Bobcat and moved donated gravel to paths.

February 2021

Installed 49 boulders in the three areas of the Pollinator Garden.

March 2021

Paradise Gardeners Volunteers installed 105 plants in the three areas of the pollinator garden.

Lions Club donated bench installed.

Teams of Paradise Gardener Volunteers begin weekly watering of plants.

April 2021

Second bench installed in the westerly pollinator garden.

Kiosk pad donated and installed.

May 2021

Docents led three tours of the garden with community members.

Kiosk installed by an Eagle Scout candidate and volunteers.



Soon after the Engelmann Oaks were installed in the parking lot in September, Western Bluebirds discovered the new trees. We have spotted them flying among the Engelmann Oaks and the Western Redbuds on many of our subsequent visits.

Sustainable Planting

Our landscape design was created by Illisa Goldman from the City of San Diego Parks and Recreation Department. We consulted with both the California Native Plant Society and Native West Nursery before making our final plant selections.



On planting day, March 5, eleven Paradise Gardeners volunteers worked for three hours planting 91 plants.



Plants were chosen that would require little ongoing maintenance, low water requirements and could tolerate heavy soil.




Tradition dictates to expect about a 10% plant loss after planting. 100 days since planting, we have a less than 5% loss.

2020-2021 Expenditures

We came in under budget for the Pollinator Garden.

The City donated left over gravel from their resurfacing of the main path. The Eagle Scout raised funds and purchased all materials for the kiosk. The cost of plants, boulders and mulch were less than originally quoted since we received non-profit discounts.

Since receiving the Right of Entry to the Pollinator Garden in November 2020, our volunteers have contributed 1299 hours to its success.

Monitoring

Paradise Hills Native Garden is placed over a closed, covered landfill. The City of San Diego Environmental Department is responsible for monitoring the landfill and requires Paradise Gardeners to monitor any digging with a gas monitor.

Since approval of our gas monitor in January 2021, we have had 8 different digging days where the gas meter reading was done every half hour.

EVERY reading was zero.

Next Steps

Planning ahead and looking forward we will:

- Gain the Right of Entry from the City of San Diego to complete the remainder of the project.
- Eradicate the invasive goathead weeds, Tribulus terrestris.
- Plant wildflowers in approved areas once the weeds are fully eradicated.
- Continue applying for smaller grants for regular maintenance and plant replacement.
- Continue recruiting interested volunteers for sustainment of the project.
- Reach out to local schools to begin scheduling field trips.
- Build additional relationships with like minded organizations.



Goatheads are the garden's worst nemesis. They hitchhike into other areas via foot traffic. The burrs puncture tires, injure dog paws and stick to shoes. Goatheads need to be controlled <u>outside</u> the native garden to keep them from choking out the plantings inside the native garden.
